PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP Pulling together for health

Message in a Bottle



This is a method of informing others of medication you take should

you be unable to communicate through sudden illness. Details of your medicines are written down and placed in a small bottle which you keep in your fridge. Personal information such as illnesses, next of kin, etc, can also be included. As nearly every household has a fridge, friends and relatives would know where to look for information on your medication and be able to source it for you.

Medical information can also be printed off from the medical practice and put in the bottle. This information is available electronically to ambulance staff. You can update personal details at the medical practice and your information will be updated. Stickers are available which are placed behind your front door and on your fridge.

Should emergency services such as an ambulance crew or nurses need to attend you, they know to look for the stickers and can see what medication you are using. The bottle system has been trialled in the area and has given reassurance to those using it, especially those living alone. The medical practice is out of bottles at the moment but expects a new batch to arrive within a few weeks. If you would like to use the Message in a Bottle service, please look out for the posters advertising it, and when you see them, ask at reception. This service is free.

Dementia Friends

Dementia is an umbrella term used to describe a range of progressive neurological disorders, that is, conditions affecting the brain. There are many different types of dementia, of which Alzheimer's disease is the most common. Some people may have a combination of types of dementia. Regardless of which type is diagnosed, each person will experience their dementia in their own unique way. The two most common types of dementia are Alzheimer's disease and vascular dementia.

Symptoms of dementia can include memory problems, processing information, and communication. A dementia awareness day was held in Kinlochleven and was attended by fifteen local people, including members of the patient participation group. Geraldine Ditta of Dementia Friends Scotland led a session wherein she explained the illness in detail and gave insights of dementia from a patient's perspective. Dementia Friends is an Alzheimer Scotland initiative and aims to raise awareness about dementia and to reduce the stigma surrounding it. Anybody can become a Scottish Dementia Friend. It's just about understanding a bit more about dementia and the small things you can do to help people with the condition. This could be helping someone find the right bus or being patient in a till queue if someone with dementia is taking longer to pay. Every action counts......

The PPG will endeavour to organise a free dementia awareness session in Ballachulish in the Spring. Look out for the date on the usual notice boards and on social media.

LOCAL TRANSPORT NEWS

Below are some updates from the recent meeting of the Lochaber Transport Forum

- **Buses:** The summer Citylink and Stagecoach timetable will begin at the end of May. Booking fees are up from 50p to £1. It has been suggested that Number 44 buses (serving Ballachulish) should all have easier access for shopping bags, prams etc Work is on-going to re-establish a minibus to service areas around Loch Leven
- **Rail:** There are 370 stations in Scotland, not all with car access, eg Corrour. Scotrail are currently erecting electronic signs at stations and West Highland stations will be having signs by local artists about the area and giving connections to walking routes. There are also plans to hold short plays in station cafes
- Ferries: There are more services, carrying more passengers, but a drop in commercial vehicles

Car Scheme: The car scheme is available for door t door uplifts any time during weekdays to any locatio in the local area. There is a small charge and th service is available to everyone living locally. Phon 01397 701222

THE PARISH OF KILMALLIE excerpts from lengthy statistical account revised 1966

The Belford Hospital was opened in 1965 by Princess Margaret. It stands on the site of a convent and has 30 surgical, 12 medical and 10 maternity beds plus an operating theatre which is one of the best equipped in Scotland. Patients from the Argyll side of Kinlochleven are usually removed to Glencoe General Hospital or to Oban Cottage Hospital.

Kinlochleven. The Gaelic name is Ceann 'head or end' Loch Liobhan - 'elm water'.

The worst flood on (sic) history – February 12 1962 when 5 inches of rain fell in 24 hours and the level of the Leven rose by 10 feet. The stately Tartan Hotel, once a shooting lodge, was washed away. Bishop Forbes in 1770 had an excellent breakfast (there) – beef, ham, pullets, salmon, milk in different shapes etc together with a bottle of good wine and a bowl of punch.

(Originally) a small mill existed and at one time a lint mill, two cottages and another shooting lodge. But Kinlochleven as an industrial village only commenced to take shape in 1906, when as many as 3000 men were at work on the site (to produce electricity and aluminium).

1905 – a Post Office. 1908 - butcher, baker, grocer and draper. 1911- further block of eight shops.

Electricity supplied initially free of charge to every house.

At first Kinlochleven was entirely in Argyllshire but in 1914 dual control became necessary (Inverness-shire one side of central river, Argyllshire the other).

Refuse is dumped about 2 miles down the loch on the south side below the road to Ballachulish.

A funeral service is always conducted from the doorway of the house, so that all. Regardless of denomination can share in it.

Broken homes are the exception; the bond of family life is strong. For example, in 1966 an unmarried mother of eight children, obliged to quit Oban, was given a house and a right

cordial welcome in the village. This is the action of people who speak the language of the heart rather than that of the law!

In the loch opposite the dump is Eilean nam Ban, or Isle of women. When the dump was in use the island would many seagulls sitting on it so giving its nickname.....
