
The cubs stayed in the village and had a barbecue (right) and games, which they all thoroughly enjoyed.

DUROR AND ST MUNDA'S PARISH CHURCH OF SCOTLAND

We've just recently enjoyed hosting end of term services or assemblies as schools break up for summer and we wish children and staff well. The theme was 'Change'. For some this was a natural moving on from class to class or going on to secondary school from primary but for some school staff and parents this is a painful and worrying time. Changes in the clustering of local schools, in the provision of support staff and in teacher and head teacher staffing leaves many wondering what will happen in August.

There's general consensus that the Church needs to change. Many people think we're outdated and irrelevant so, even though they might be surprised if they heard the message inside, not many come. The way the Church has been over the last 50 years, at least in many places, cannot be the way the Church continues. At this year's General Assembly of the Church of Scotland virtually all of the many specific proposals for change that were put forward were enthusiastically accepted. This will mean radical changes at national and local levels and we should seize opportunities because we have a great message which could make a lot of difference if only it were heard.

We continue to support refugees through 'Lochaber Supports Refugees' and, as well as continuing to be a 'drop-off' point for general donations, are making a special collection of toiletries and men's underwear (small and medium sizes) during July and August which will be sent to refugee camps.

With Ballachulish School we're supporting the Mary's Meals 'Backpack Project'. 'Mary's Meals' is a charity which is best known for providing food at schools in some poorer countries to encourage hungry children to get an education which might help them out of poverty later in their life. The 'Backpack Project' recognises that many of these children don't have the basics for learning such as pencils, notepads and P.E. kit.

If school bags are being replaced over the summer or if there are old ones lying in a cupboard then, if they're in reasonable condition, they can be brought to the school or church and we

encourage church members or anyone in the community to donate stationery articles or children's P.E. kit items to fill them. 'Mary's Meals' will arrange to transport them to appropriate schools.

A CENTURY OF HOMES FIT FOR HEROES

If you walk round our village, you will pass dozens of houses, but have you ever thought about their history? Who built them and when?

Between Ballachulish and Glenachulish, well over half of our homes were either built by, or subsequently owned by either a local council or housing association. This is above the national average, but thanks to the exceptional efforts of Glasgow City Council and it's neighbours, who built several hundred thousand homes between the wars alone, well below the Scottish average. So how did it all begin?

Towards the end of World War One, the Government decided that the existing housing stock across Britain was rapidly deteriorating and well below what people deserved, especially those soldiers who had been away fighting. The Tudor Walters Report of 1918 was produced with a series of recommendations on how to address the situation. The main thrust was that those building companies which had survived the war were completely unprepared for building the volume of property required, and that the state, through the local councils, needed to step in and take over. Locally, of course, this also included a number of Forestry Houses and some of the local estates were also involved, but all through the same Government funded scheme.

The first houses were built in 1919, and while progress was understandably slow to start with, by 1939 hundreds of thousands of new homes had been built across Scotland, and over a million across Britain as a whole.

Coming back to Ballachulish, Argyll Cottages, West Laroch Crescent and the flats of Leven Terrace and Lorne Cottages (right, soon after they were built) were all built, as well as the houses in Glenachulish. Park Road and Albert Road were started in 1939, but only a handful of houses were completed before war broke out again. Work continued slowly



during the war, with several photos surviving of half finished houses, the local men working on them when they were home for leave. The last of the houses were finally completed in the early 1950s.

After World War Two, thanks to German bombs, the need for new housing was ever more pressing, and so the prefabs were designed and built across the country – Ballachulish getting a group as the original houses of Croft Road. A decade or so later, and the prefabs were replaced with houses similar to those already built in West Laroch and MacColl Terrace, which had replaced the old white cottages seen in the photo above.

GLENCOE MUSEUM REDEVELOPMENT PLANS

We aim to create a space that is fit for purpose and accessible to all, and hope to encourage community engagement both during the redevelopment and going forward.

COMMUNITY COMPANY NEWS

The Community Company has not taken up the offer on the Glenachulish Hydro Scheme from GHR due to the time scale of FITS closure and amendments to the existing Plan would have meant the Community being put at risk.

Very briefly, the Company looked at the end of FITS deadline in March

2019, and contacted all of the relevant bodies to discuss the options available. The basic outcome was that with a build schedule of 12 months and having to alter the existing Planning Permission, we could not have met the strict timescales required. We were unwilling to put the Community at risk, over a process of which we had no control. The Company are now waiting to see what, if any, further scheme from the Scottish Government becomes available to assist Communities to become more resilient.



WHAT'S GOING ON?

West Highland Local Plan

The Highland Council Local Plan has now been passed by the independent Reporter; the result of which is that the Croft Housing site has been added into the Local Plan, while West Laroch has not been included after being on the local plan previously. This is contrary to the community wishes, which were expressed to the Highland Council on a number of occasions.

The access for any development in the croft would be from Croft Road, and not West Laroch as has been discussed in the past. Visit the HC Planning Portal to view the Local Plan.

Community Issues

River Laroch – Scottish Water has agreed to carry out repair and reinstatement works, but

we are still awaiting the result of the discussions between

HC and SW to agree the works.

Community Tidy up and Grass Cutting date to be agreed, we are looking to increase the volunteer base to allow us to carry out tidy up works on a regular schedule. May I take this opportunity to thank all the previous volunteers for their valued assistance in the past projects.

If there were any doubts as to the worth of having a Shinty Memories Group in Ballachulish, they were completely dispelled by the end of the afternoon.


The Group was presented with a Memories Box - the initial practical catalyst for all new Groups. Photographs, old programmes, medals, old strips and equipment can all be added to


TAKE YOUR PARTNERS

James of The Glen Steps at Ballachulish Bridge

Some details on the current condition and proposed refurbishment works to the stairway from the A828 to the A82 (and the James Stewart Memorial site) at the south end of Ballachulish Bridge.

There have been reports of steps becoming loose recently. BEAR's Corpach depot has put signage out to warn pedestrians of the hazardous area. These two steps will be reset at the earliest opportunity once there is a suitable weather window.

BEAR Scotland on behalf of Transport Scotland is programming works to overhaul the steps and improve DDA accessibility. They are working to commence on site this September 2019. The refurbishment work will include: securing the steps and installing anti-slip nosing; the existing handrails will be removed and DDA compliant handrails/guardrails installed in their place; tactile warning surfaces will be installed on landings; the lighting system will be upgraded; trees will be cut back (felled where appropriate) and vegetation will be cleared.

The BEAR operations team plan to inspect the steps weekly to ensure that they are secure. In the mean-time if you have reports of any loose steps, please contact BEAR Scotland's customer care team (0800 028 1414) with defect reports.
