### WELCOME!

### **BALLACHULISH TIMELINE**

Every year marks an anniversary of an important event in our local history, but 2019 sees the anniversaries of some very important developments in our local transport network.

#### 200 years ago:

The first Steamer, the Clyde based Comet, sailed up Loch Linnhe connecting Oban and Fort William. It is not known if it called at Ballachulish or not, but over the next century many of her successors did call at the local piers.

#### 125 years ago:

In 1894 the Callander and Oban railway board approved a plan to construct a railway line from Oban to Inverness, via Ballachulish. By the time it reached parliament two years later the plan had been scaled back to terminate at Ballachulish.

#### 100 years ago:

The High Road to Kinlochleven was completed. The last bridge built lies at the Kinloch end and has a small date stone confirming it was built in 1919 by Prisoners of War before they were repatriated.

#### 50 years ago:

Preparatory works commenced on the Ballachulish Bridge. Whilst it was 3 or 4 years before the major works started, ground investigations and surveys were carried out in advance of the plans being drawn up.

1969 also saw the launch of the final Ballachulish Ferry, the Glenachulish, which still sails on the Glenelg crossing to Skye each summer.

### MY COUCH TO 5K JOURNEY

#### (or running for 30mins without stopping in 9 weeks!)

This started 6 years ago when I found a podcast. Downloading the podcasts was a fantastic step forward (pardon the pun!). I had thought about running before but when I'd looked into starting it all seemed like a huge faff and more hassle than I was able to cope with. So finding a podcast that told me exactly when and what to do, and as a bonus how to do it was just the thing I was looking for to get my head into the idea I was ready for some exercise. If you have got you head around doing it and you are determined, half the battle is done.

After, my first run was done around my living room and kitchen, for my second run I went up to the lochan. My reasons being: it is fairly flat all the way around, I feel safe, it is easy, achievable walking for the first 'brisk walk warm-up', and it is gorgeous!! The Podcasts are fantastic and keep you right all the way through. You complete a series of 3 runs a week, and need to keep 1 days rest in-between. Using the Run Ballachulish/Glencoe facebook page to post my achievement 'D1 Wk1 complete' got me through quite a few runs.

Equipment - I was worried I'd need to spend lots of money to get me out; but a quick bit of research and this is really how I started - Shoes: I already had some which I bought to walk the 5k Race for Life in Glasgow and hadn't seen the light of day since. They were £6.99 from Lidl. I now have a water bottle that I can grip as I run and a kind of bumbag thing to put my phone and my car keys in. I wear exercise leggings (because I had them already), a vest top, then a long sleeve top, then a t-shirt. At the moment I find that warm enough. You start to get a wee bit chilly but, believe me, you warm up fast, and the first time I wore my warm hoodie and had to take it off and carry it, it was a HUGE pain! Ladies - sports bra! Can't stress this enough, it's the only thing essential to spend a bit of money on before you start.

Oh, & my important advice is take it slow! I really had to work on slowing down & taking it 'easy' - C25k is about stamina & endurance, speed can come later if you decide running is your thing. The slower & easier you take it now, will mean you keeping going. You end up finding a natural rhythm, & I still start slow even now!

### THE GAELIC ALPHABET

The Gaelic alphabet consists of 18 letters and they are traditionally associated with trees. It is significant that the alphabet was linked to trees and highlights the importance of the natural environment to the Scottish Gaels. It was also a memory aid for children. There are a few versions of the alphabet used throughout the Gaelic speaking areas of Scotland and the one below is from Sunart, the closest to home!

### BEHIND THE SCENES AT THE MUSEUM

It is a sad reality of museums that only a small fraction of objects in their collections are on display to the public; the rest are hidden away in storage, awaiting their turn in the spotlight. Here at Glencoe Folk Museum, we are undertaking a collections cataloguing project, which involves volunteers going through boxes and recording the objects that they find within. This has turned up a variety of weird and wonderful objects, and we wanted to share some of our favourites with you!

One of the more unusual finds in our collections was this fantastic Bambi soap! This item was discovered in an old croft house in Glencoe and donated to the museum in 2007 by Mrs Una Roger. Cussons produced a whole range of Disney soaps in the 40s and 50s - many people obviously thought they were too precious to be used and they have become collectors' items!





These

beautiful children's booties were recently catalogued by our Collections Volunteer, Helen, and she says that they are her favourite items so far! It is incredible to think of the work that went into these, and they were obviously treasured and cared for before being donated to the museum.

Finally, these lovely teddies were left behind at the museum in the 80s, and later

accessioned into our permanent collections (though we should note that it is not standard museum policy to accession lost property, so don't worry - if you leave your umbrella behind it is not going to end up in a display case!)

### LANDS END TO JOHN O'GROATS (LEJOG)

Any keen cyclist will tell you that crossing Britain from Lands End to John O'Groats is high on the bucket list. Never for one minute did we think that two slightly overweight dads would complete the 1100 mile route. We had planned to go light-weight with the camper-van support of the father-in-law, but a week before the start Bill took ill. To be honest we had simply not trained enough to be carrying two weeks of laundry by ourselves and to make matters worse storm Callum had been forecast to hit the South-East on the day we were to start.

The storm hit Lands End on day one. Normally, we would have postponed but accommodation was booked ahead we had no choice but to set off like two shopping trollies on ice. Even kevlar tyres could not prevent the first of ten



punctures and so there we were, just four miles in, soaked, exhausted, and wishing we were back home.

Cornwall may be beautiful but the rolling hills did nothing for our morale, and I can honestly say it was the hardest two days of the whole trip. The big climb up to Dartmoor at least meant we had finally started to head North instead of East, although it felt like I had already left my legs back in Lands End. Once through Bristol, which luckily could be crossed by cycle track, we

were over the Severn Bridge into Wales. Skirting the border through Shrewsbury up to Runcorn and then Bolton, the contrasts in culture and landscape was wonderful to see. We were now averaging over 80 miles a day which at our snails pace and with everything apart from the kitchen sink strapped to our bikes, was taking around eight hours.We were now in a rhythm and at this point started to think that this may just be possible. Yorkshire into the Lakes really was stunning and just like Christmas, if you believe that Santa delivers you presents in the form of the father-in-law



turning up in his camper after feeling much better. There were tears of joy when we could finally ditch the kit.

Next came Gretna and "Welcome to Scotland" and cycling along the Clyde we were now in familiar territory. Then the dreaded A82. No cycle track to escape it so we set off early and pedalled as fast as we could. Glencoe was hell, headwind and flat tyres, I was a broken man. Thanks to my wife kicking me out of the door the next day, I think she had good intentions. The cycle track and canal to Inverness was a magical moment and with only a couple more days we knew we could do it.

If you have never been across the centre of Northern Scotland then I can tell you it is a desolate place. Nothing but bog for miles with the odd isolated mountain and we were lucky on our final leg of our journey, as the early morning sleet changed to full on hail which at least bounced off. Seeing the family at John O'Groats would have brought a tear to any man's eye. Having completed one of the hardest things I have ever done I can look back with pride. We saw a wonderful country and met some amazing people and even the lows could not take away the sense of achievement we felt at crossing the whole country in 14 days. *Karl Griffin* 

What Karl hasn't mentioned above, but has said in conversation is how amazed they were by the huge variety of (mostly) beautiful landscapes which this ride took them through. England, Wales and finally Scotland, three very diverse countries which are well worth exploring!

### SCHOOLS UPDATE

Many of you will be aware that our local schools are currently undergoing a management review. This is part of a Highland wide process to reduce head teacher vacancies, improve resilience and hopefully save some money from the budgets.

There have been lengthy discussions between all six of the South Lochaber Schools, and there is now a general consensus for the following structure:

- Kinlochleven will become a 3-18 campus with a single Head Teacher supported by primary and secondary Depute Heads.
- Glencoe and St Brides will maintain their current cluster, with a Cluster Head and Principal Teacher.
- Duror will be moved into a cluster with Ballachulish, again with a Cluster Head and Principal Teacher.

At the time of writing this is only the favoured proposal, and there is still time for further discussions, which will be held at a series of Parent Council Meetings and Community Council meetings over the next couple of weeks, before the next meeting of all stakeholders in the middle of February. If you have any queries or concerns, please contact the relevant council. Presuming that a structure is agreed, the Highland Council will begin the process of implementation with a view to the new structure starting after the Summer Holidays.

One big positive seems to be that the 4 schools at this end of the loch are likely to be drawn closer from a combination of current and future links.

### LOCAL TRANSPORT NEWS

The following points were raised and discussed at the December meeting of the Lochaber Transport Forum:

- The Bus service to Raigmore Hospital from Fort William was criticised. It was suggested that as the need for this service is likely to increase in the future, the NHS should be asked to part fund the service.
- The Fort William to Oban service was also criticised as it was completely unsuitable for commuters or most other local needs, and indeed for Tourist use. West Coast Motors, who operate the route, have stated that they need more funding to provide an additional service, and it was suggested that incoming and expanding local businesses should be asked to contribute to the local infrastructure in general.
- Finally, the connecting times between services were discussed, with the 50 minute wait in Ballachulish to get from Kinlochleven to Glasgow coming under particular criticism.

### Vandalism in Quarry

It has been brought to the community council's attention that there has been a spate of vandalism in the quarry in recent weeks. This has ranged from smashed glass bottles to the more serious damage of the wee Croc and elsewhere in the Quarry.

#### **Croft Gates**

We reported last summer about the work carried out by volunteers on the handrail at the steps from the bridge into the croft. Unfortunately, since then the gate has come off its hinges due to excessive wear to the hinge itself. This should be a fairly simple thing to fix, but unfortunately it is proving difficult for us to find time to attend to it. All of the gates into the croft and the playpark need regular maintenance, and the catch on the playpark gate is also needing attention.

If you have a spare half hour and basic DIY skills, please feel free to take a look at the gates and if you feel able please carry out any necessary repairs. If this is likely to incur costs please contact the community council to discuss first – any reasonable receipts should be reimbursed.
