FOODBANK UPDATE

Ballachulish Community Support Group is pleased to confirm that, thanks to funding from HIE, we have appointed Rachael Crewesmith to the role of Community Support Worker. Rachael's role will consist of running the foodbank and assisting with our communications and forward planning. She has been a member of the foodbank team since it opened and we are delighted to have her on board in this more formal role. Rachael will be in post until the end of September.

Thank you to everyone who has donated to the Food Bank so far. As we move into this next phase of easing of lockdown and government income support starts to reduce, we anticipate the food bank being needed as much as ever. As a lot of our volunteer team are returning to work, we have reduced the opening hours to just Tuesday from now on and we have a new team of amazing volunteers to help staff the food bank. We are so grateful to them for giving up their time and energy for this important community service.

The Food Bank was established on the back of the pandemic and whilst it is for anyone, it is especially for people who are negatively affected by Covid19. There are many people who do not have any other type of social support, have had their working hours cut or who have fallen through the gaps of the government support schemes. If you feel this is you or you know of someone please encourage them to get in touch.

We are open every Tuesday 4pm-6pm in Ballachulish Village Hall and there is a confidential helpline where you can leave a message and a member of the team will get back to you. We can also arrange discreet delivery at any time.

Thanks to the continued generosity of Morrisons, the Coop and local donations we have handed out over 140 food parcels and are regularly supporting around twenty families.

If you are thinking of donating to the food bank, there are several ways to do it. If you have a glut of something from your garden; be it veg, fruit or herbs we would be delighted to take this. Home baked goodies also fly out of the door. You can also make a financial donation – see details on welcome page in this edition of Slatest News.

A PERSONAL LOG BY E W WYLD ON HER FIRST VISIT TO THE HIGH ARCTIC - PART 1

We first came to Scotland in 1955 to stay at Ardarroch Outdoor Centre (now a private house). We had done a lot of walking – Simon had climbed in Wales – and we were looking for an adventure! I have a certificate from 1955 to say I've been up the Ben! We became good friends with Mike & Avril Hammond who were running the centre at that time. I have been here now for 20 years, and only went to the Arctic for the first time because someone dropped out of a recce to find new ways north. Lucky Me! I did have some winter training and Simon was in the Mountain Rescue in Derbyshire and also helped when up here, with Hamish and the Dogs.

Introduction

Having enjoyed many previous expeditions from the comfort of the armchair (MH+A Scientific expeditions to Spitsbergen with Simon Wyld, 1970-1989), it was now my turn to see at first hand what all the excitement was about. This is my personal log of the Spring 1990 expedition to Spitsbergen, the main island of Svalbard. These islands lie between 77 and 80 degrees north, and are warmed by the Gulf stream, so that during the summer they become free of the polar ice pack.



After months of planning and the collection of gear, food, maps and second hand knowledge, it was now time to travel on the great adventure to the far north.

Thursday 29th March

The taxi arrived at 7.15pm prompt, and after a clear run to the airport arriving at 7.50, we were advised that there was space on an earlier flight, the 8.10 to Heathrow. The flight was half empty so we enjoyed a free drink, dinner and good service after a very hectic day. Ann met us at Heathrow and we proceeded to Putney for support and an update on the travellers in the southern hemisphere (A reference to family currently travelling in New Zealand).

Friday 30th March

I was woken by the sound of planes at 5.30am so got up, had breakfast and arrived at Heathrow again for 8.00 to meet Mike, Avril, Haggis and Kelvin. Haggis had my overboots and Avril my overtrousers so at last I had all my equipment.

We proceeded to check in baggage to be told that we were way over the amount allowed and that it would cost us 50 pounds, which we must pay before we all could get boarding passes! So we paid up and went for coffee. I'd been this far before and then bidden them farewell, but this time I went through to the departure lounge and on to the plane. 10.30



and we were up and away over the North Sea bound for Oslo.

After a nice lunch we zoomed into land at Oslo 1.30pm local time. The airport was very busy so we checked through the luggage, no excess this time, and off for another drink. I purchased 30 Spitsbergen postcards and 30 stamps, not to be written until I had arrived on the island.

It was very hot in the airport and we had five hours to kill so we caught the 'flybussen' to Oslo. It has certainly changed since 1981 (Family holidays in camper vans to Norway/Sweden/Finland), concrete and glass everywhere right out to the airport, even a toll road. In the centre of town it was 18°C, open air markets, lots of pedestrianization and many different nationalities. We walked up towards the palace past the university, paused for tea and then took a bus back to the airport for a planning meeting. We talked about rifle practice, cordons for bear warning, skidoo checks and sledge packing. It was difficult to imagine while sitting round a table in a stuffy airport lounge.

At last we were off for Tromso in a full DC9, sitting back from the wing hoping to see the Lofoten islands but the stewardess warned us of bad weather north of Tromso, and the possibility of no further flight north. There was very little snow round Oslo but the lakes appeared frozen. As we flew north the cloud thickened and it began to snow. At last we descended into a blanket of cloud and landed safely and stepped out into the cold night air with snow on the ground and the temperature -1°C.

We were to be delayed for an hour before the storm eased, the plane was sprayed with deicer and we went off again. We had yet another meal and looked out of the window to see an odd eerie red orange and yellow light in the sky. As we descended, this disappeared and we could see ice platelets in the sea. Land appeared from nowhere and we were on a snowy Spitsbergen runway. We stepped out into the clear silent night surrounded by white mountains, a bright moon and -19°C at midnight. We walked to the hanger to be met by the 'politi' and a lady with 3 keys for the hotel. Mike had to fill in a yellow form stating where we were going, we reclaimed our luggage and set off for the hotel. The wooden building had 40 single rooms, a common room and bathroom facilities. It was very warm and I spent the night on the floor wondering what Saturday would bring.

RECENT ANNIVERSARIES

On the Slatest News Facebook Page we have been keeping track of some of the anniversaries relevant to our community and surrounding area. Here are a few highlights:

3rd July

Forty Five years ago today a tremendous bang reverberated up and down Loch Leven, and was reputedly heard in Kinlochleven. It was as loud, if not louder, than any of the blasts in the Quarry before it shut 20 years earlier.

The calamitous cause of the noise became clear all too soon. A bearing had failed on the



new bridge that was spanning the Ballachulish Narrows. Suddenly any hope to have the bridge open to traffic in October was gone, and not only did the engineers need to work out how to replace the failed bearing, they also needed to check the others. According to the newspaper report of the day, Cleveland Bridge engineers flew up to make the inspection and discovered that a bearing cracked on one of the bridges pillars. Fortunately it could be replaced and there have been no other structural problems identified in the last 45 years!

30th June

At the end of the School Year in June 1967 Ballachulish saw the closure of St Johns School. Originally built in the 1870s, the school had served the community for nearly a century, and had replaced the old Banks School which was based in the old Banks church, roughly where the village hall now stands.

In 1879 St Johns School had had 84 pupils, but in its last year only 21 were on the school roll. For the following year some transferred to St Mary's School in Glencoe as it was also an Episcopal School. Most, however, moved to the Ballachulish county school, which is still in use.

Following the closure of the school, the building was initially retained as a church and community hall, but then sold and converted into a home.



26th June

On this day in 1978 work started on tidying up the village. Thousands of tonnes of slate waste and top soil were moved and landscaped, thousands of trees planted and, along with the construction of the Ballachulish bypass, new paths, roads and car parks created. It was a long and arduous process, which we think was worth



it as it created the beautiful shoreline and hillside we can all now enjoy.

21st June

Today is the Longest Day, the Summer Solstice, Midsummer's Day. Whatever you call it we have around 20 hours of daylight to enjoy.

However, on this day back in 1887 Ballachulish was celebrating Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee; 50 years on the throne, and a Slate



Memorial was erected to remember the day. Thanks to some hard work by Philip MacLean and Stephen MacKenzie recently, the stone is now fully visible once more above the A82.



BALLACHULISH - COMING OUT OF LOCKDOWN

Here are some key points, in case you missed them in Slatest Extra:

- Green / Red flag signs can be taken down from 15th July
- The 811999 resilience number was replaced by 01855 604377 from 15th July

- Our Facebook page will stay live and we will continue to post information and updates on what we're up to.
