BALLACHULISH TIMELINE

There is no doubt that there is a lot of debate about our communities future at present, but lets first take a moment to look back at the history of our village:

150 Years ago: The cottages and JSMTC building on Loanfern are believed to have been built in c1870.

75 Years ago: The first Co-op opened in the village on 1st December 1945, sited opposite Fern Villa where Quarry Cottages now stand. A few days earlier is the first reference in Hansard to a parliamentary discussion regarding bridging the Ballachulish Narrows, with a road bridge.





COMMUNITY COUNCIL PUBLIC MEETING PENINSULA DEVELOPMENT REPORT

The following is a brief overview of the numerous points of discussion at the packed meeting on 7th January. Thanks to everyone who attended and provided a near unanimous view on the way the community would like to proceed.

Large parts of the land in the proposal are constructed from waste slate materials produced by the Slate quarries in their production process, the area was dressed during the regeneration of the village in the 1970s by SDA works. There have been test bores done by the Council in the past on the West Peninsula area and it was deemed to be unsuitable for building on due to the base being unstable.

The matter of the purchase of the land was raised. It is known that it was originally leased and at some point this was changed to ownership, although details remain uncertain at present. Highland Council was the previous owner at the time of transfer, further details are being sought from HC for clarification.

A number of issues were raised with Laurence Young, one of the developers of the Proposed Development of the area. Part of the area is designated for commercial and tourist development in the Local Plan, which is available for the public to access either online or in the council offices in Fort William. The designated areas are small on both the West and East Peninsulas and the Developers proposal document shows development extending outwith the designated area, mainly on the West Peninsulas.

The issue of community benefit was raised - what will the Community gain from the Proposal. The West Peninsula is heavily used by locals and visitors; dog walkers; local walking groups; fishermen; photographers and people enjoying the view points. The area is one of the only level walking areas linked into the village for public use and could easily be up graded to 'access for all' standard.

Other environmental issues were also raised about the exposure of the site and future flood level risks. Existing pathways are in poor condition. The area is also home to a wide range of wildlife, including a number of animals, such as otters, seals, herons, pine martins, deer, insects, butterflies and moths. Numerous birds also visit the site. All of these are regularly seen at the appropriate time of the year.

Some interesting issues were raised about community input for using our historical, environmental past and future. We have a Community Action Plan, due to be updated, which has raised a number of the Community concerns.

At the end of the meeting a show of hands for and against the current proposal was raised. The majority voted against the proposal. A subsequent show of hands also showed a majority in favour of investigating the possibility of a community land transfer.

A developer meeting took place, after Slatest went to press, on the 26th January where developers and architects were present to discuss the proposals and answer questions raised by community.

DUROR AND ST MUNDA'S PARISH CHURCH OF SCOTLAND

With challenges to St Munda's church building we're worshipping in the church hall in the winter months. This gives a cosier atmosphere both in terms of temperature and in gathering us closer together. The mood is brighter, the singing better and the hall gives the flexibility for different forms of worship. This will sometimes involve using a projector and will include 'Café Church' on at least a couple of occasions; everyone is always welcome. We now serve tea and coffee before the services so people come a little earlier to have a chat before we start.



In November we had a really interesting and entertaining evening listening to Susan, Sandra and Ewan giving us a wonderfully illustrated talk about their experiences of 'Walking the Camino de Santiago' and evenings of entertainment will continue shortly with a film night with a little something extra! Look out for posters.

Later on in February we'll start a series of thought provoking sessions during the period of Lent. These will be on different days and at different times of day in the hope that it gives everyone a chance to get to at least one. As always — everyone is welcome and details will follow.

We continue to be involved with 'Lochaber Supports Refugees' and are always interested in

ideas for charities that we might be able to support.

RIVERBANK

As many of you will have seen, the storms and torrential rain so far this year have taken their toll on the riverbank between Albert Road and the Underpass. The community council are closely monitoring the situation, and are in regular contact with Highland Council and our MSP to try and get repair works organised.

At present work is scheduled for May / June due to the possibility of disturbing young fish in the river. However, we are trying our best to get these works brought forwards as a matter of urgency.

In the meantime we would advise anyone using the path to take the greatest of care, particularly with pets and children, as the river is eating away at the path, and the wooden fence is no longer safe. We do not want the path to be closed long term, but this may be necessary, and ultimately is up to the Highland Council.

SCHOOL UPDATE

In a letter dated 20th December, the Highland Council updated parents on staffing changes which took effect at the beginning of this school term. Mr MacGregor has taken up his new post as Cluster Head for St Brides and Glencoe Primaries, allowing Mrs Ainsley Burns to take up her role as Cluster head for Ballachulish and Duror. This means that Carol Divers has returned to be a class teacher in Ballachulish.

This should be the final changes regarding head teachers, and will hopefully lead to a period of stability following the numerous staff changes experienced over the last year.

Glencoe Folk Museum might be closed for winter right now, but there's plenty going on behind the scenes. Our Curator, Catriona, is busy refreshing our displays ready for opening for the season in April (come along to see what's new!)

Looking ahead we're also making progress with our exciting redevelopment project, which will transform the Museum's exhibitions and visitor facilities including new covered spaces and the installation of toilets for the first time! Over the last few months we've been surveying our visitors and the local community to learn how best the Museum could develop. This has produced some really useful feedback which has been fed into our redevelopment. The project is still at an early stage but we're especially excited by plans to convert our byre outbuilding into a Community Exhibition Gallery for local groups and schools to



produce their own displays and allowing for regularly rotating exhibitions – meaning there'll always be something new to see in the Museum. We're also aiming to rejuvenate all our exhibitions to bring local history to life like never before while taking care to retain the existing unique 'quirky' charm which has proved popular with tourists and local visitors.

GLENACHULISH COMMUNITY HYDRO



Lochaber Environmental Group has been given the opportunity to take **ENVIRONMENTAL GROUP** on the building and running of a low carbon hydro-electric scheme in Glenachulish and we all have an opportunity to be involved in making this clean energy project a reality by purchasing community shares to fund its construction..

The plans to build a 544kw hydro-electric scheme in Glenachulish are well on the way following a positive feasibility study and with the relevant planning permission and licences in place. Once built and operating the hydro scheme will generate enough power for 420 houses and the surplus funds from the Hydro will be used to support LEG's environmental projects across the whole of Lochaber.

"We are very excited to have been offered this opportunity to take on the development of a Community Owned Hydro for Lochaber", said Marian Austin, Chair of LEG. "We hope Lochaber residents and visitors will jump at the chance to support environmental projects across the area by buying community shares in the Hydro".

LEG is now in the process of creating a new 'society', to be known as 'LEG Power', which is legally allowed to raise funds by offering 'Community shares'. In line with other successful community owned Hydro schemes in Scotland, local residents and visitors to Lochaber will soon be offered the opportunity to buy 'community shares' to help fund the building of the Hydro.

Community Shares are a practical way of supporting a local business that serves your community and the primary motivation is different from that of shareholders in companies because financial motivation is at best secondary. However interest rates on community shares are likely to be equivalent to or better than you will currently get from a bank. Community Shares cannot be transferred between people: instead, the Society allows shareholders to withdraw their share capital, subject to terms that protect the society's financial security. All community shareholders have one vote, regardless of the size of their shareholding, so LEG Power will be democratic.

Any shortfall in the funds raised from the Community Share offer will be financed by commercial

loans. Most importantly, net profits will be handed to LEG to ensure maximum community benefit with the majority of payments used to fund more environmental initiatives across Lochaber.

A public drop-in information session held in December in Glenachulish (right) was well attended and the feedback was positive. This was the first of many events planned by LEG to tell Lochaber residents and visitors about the scheme and the opportunities it offers. Any individuals or

CHRISTMAS LIGHTS

There is growing interest in getting new Christmas Lights for the village. The Community Council have been working towards this in recent years, but we need more community involvement and support to raise sufficient money. Below is an outline of the current position:

We currently have 23 power outlets on posts for lamps to be fitted. Of these 20-22 have been in use in recent years.

Our current lights are as follows:

- 4 New in 2019, which are cheap stopgap units
- 4 New in 2018
- 7 New in 2014
- 8 are approximately 10-12 years old and have received running repairs
- 2 are older and there are also 3 or 4 broken units which are probably not repairable.

There are approximately 8 other locations where lights could be added, but these would need to have power sockets added by the council, who have been reluctant to do so in the past. Some of the existing outlets could be used to power two units on one pole – such as in front

of the houses on Albert Road.

It is also important to know that a number of the lamp posts in the village are, allegedly, unsuitable for mounting lights. These include the columns in some of the side roads and also on West Laroch at the playpark.

As for cost, the most recent purchases in 2018 cost approximately £300 each including brackets. It is possible to buy cheaper units, but they are not such high quality, and prices can stretch into the thousands.

To fully refresh the older lights around the village, and add in extras where possible, we could easily be needing to raise in the region of £4-5000.

ABBEYFIELD FUNDRAISING

Abbeyfield Ballachulish is currently trying to raise funds to increase the number of its nursing beds to meet



demand for the care of older people within its surrounding areas. Charitable Trusts and the National Lottery have been approached to secure funding, but these applications have not been successful. Our independent, stand-alone charity is now registering with "Just Giving" in the hope that we will be able to raise enough funds to enable charitable Trusts to step forward with matching funds.

The demand for care beds continues to rise in the area and we wish to continue to support the partnership we have with our local communities going forward and, in particular, to provide a valuable resource that supports the work of Health and Social Care services.
